

And the Winner is . . . Illusory Gearbox

Start-Up Earns \$12,000 for Make-It-Yourself, Interactive Toy

Riverpoint Academy students Zachary Zschoche and Jenna Lawrey are the co-owners of Illusory Gearbox, a toy designed to help teach elementary students cognitive skills. This invention was pitched at both the WSU Business Plan and NW Entrepreneur competitions where they took home first place honors and earned \$12,000! An amazing accomplishment for a high school junior and sophomore, especially when you consider the majority of the competitors were college students. Riverpoint Academy senior Daniel Dylina placed 2nd at these same contests earning \$6,500. His story is part of our Celebrating the Class of 2017 segment located on page 2.

Zach and Jenna have a curious partnership. It is on the one hand "odd" because their skill sets are so clearly opposite, but on the other hand it is "inquisitive" because they are both collaborative problem-solvers. Zach, the creator of Illusory Gearbox, is a selfdescribed B- student who, before coming to Riverpoint Academy, typically sat in the back of the classroom. He loves designing, building, mechanics and engineering. Organization is not his strong suit. Enter Jenna who is shy (at least compared to Zach), detail-oriented and a straight A, math-science nerd. She is in charge of marketing and sales for Illusory Gearbox. Zach freely admits Jenna "keeps him on track."

As part of their course work Zach and Jenna developed a written business plan. In their executive summary they highlighted the need in our digitally dominated society for hands-on learning opportunities and put forward Illusory Gearbox as a unique solution to this problem. Illusory Gearbox is a take home kit parents build with their children.

Although marketed as a children's toy, Illusory Gearbox looks like a piece of art – something you could proudly display on your coffee table or bookcase.

How will they spend their start-up money? Zach plans to purchase a computer so he can continue designing over the summer. He would also like to buy a 3D printer and build his own laser cutter. Jenna, no surprise to Zach, will save her money so it is available to help with unexpected costs associated with bringing Illusory Gearbox to market.

Illusory Gearbox will soon be available to purchase online. Estimated purchase price is a very reasonable \$20.

Facilities Planning Committee Recommends Future Projects for School Board Consideration

The Mead School District Facilities Planning Committee began meeting in early January 2017, and held 15 meetings through May 2, 2017. The committee studied student enrollment projections and the physical condition of existing school and non-school buildings. Each school principal shared building-specific needs and our maintenance and transportation departments explained their facility challenges. Of significant importance to the committee in making their recommendation was the steady increase in student enrollment over the past ten years (+733 students) and the significant jump of 2,943 students projected by Davis Demographics in the next ten years (2017-2026). Committee recommendations are summarized below:

Major Projects

New Middle School (grades 6-8), New Elementary School (grades K-5), New Transportation Co-Op and New Maintenance Facility . . . PLUS work at old Mead Middle School to ready it for use as an outdoor soccer/ marching band/football venue as well as a future elementary school site.

Miscellaneous Projects

 Play Structure Safety Mats @ six Elementary Schools, New Carpet (Mead High, Mt. Spokane & Colbert), Wood Gym Floor (Meadow Ridge), Upgrade Pro-Start Classrooms (Mead High & Mt. Spokane), New Windows in 1st Floor Commons Area @ Mt. Spokane and Land Purchase/s. All proposed projects are subject to revision and final approval by the Mead School District Board of Directors.

As we come to the conclusion of another successful school year, I invite the entire community to join families, students and staff in celebrating the graduation of nearly 850 Mead School District seniors. We consider it an honor to have served these young men and women for the past 13 years and sincerely wish each of them the very best as they move into the next chapter of their lives. The Mead community should be extremely proud of the many academic and extra-curricular successes of the Class of 2017.

The Mead community is growing . . . which means the Mead School District is also experiencing increasing student enrollment. Earlier this school year our enrollment, for the very first time, surpassed the 10,000 mark and has continued to expand as the year has progressed. Indicators such as new single family and multifamily housing construction point to the possibility of 200 to 300 more students within the next year and the potential for an increase of 3,000 students in the next ten years!

Although growth is positive, it does present the challenge of where to house all of these new students. Increased enrollment, coupled with state mandated requirements such as all-day kindergarten, means that next year the Mead School District will be at or very near capacity in our K-8 elementary and middle schools. The Facilities Planning Committee just spent the past five months studying district facility needs to address this current and expected growth. I invite you to take a look at their recommendations summarized on page 3 of this publication.

In closing, I wish each of you a relaxing and enjoyable summer. Remember to keep your children involved by promoting ongoing learning and physical activities. Please promote literacy, STEM learning, arts, health, fitness and athletics. Have a great summer!
