Class of 1932–1954 graduates served as greeters and shared stories about the Mead School District "way back when."

Four generations came together at the Mead District Centennial Reception April 21, at Mead High School, chatting with neighbors, classmates and teachers both present and past. Attendees enjoyed snacks while perusing rich historical displays assembled through the efforts of Mead High English teacher and yearbook advisor Carol Tadlock. Delma Van Leuven, Mead class of 1932 valedictorian, and her younger brother Gordon, class of '46, both attended. "When I started school here, 'horsepower' meant the number of horses you hitched to your plow," says Delma. "We still plowed with horses then, and school was a long walk away."

Brother Gordon adds, "Most people here were rooted in place for generations because no one had the money to move. However, even through the Depression, Mead Schools provided a very good basic education." Held in conjunction with the annual Eye4Art fundraiser, which raised a record \$6,500 to support the teachers, staff and students of the Mead District with grants for projects, technology and needy students, the Centennial Reception made for a lively day at Mead.

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

National Certification for Engineering Program

The Project Lead the Way Pathway to Engineering program, in existence since 2008 at both Mt. Spokane HS and Mead HS, recently received national certification. They are two of only three high schools in the entire state to earn this recognition.



"The beauty of PLTW courses," says Mead teacher Andy Arnold, "is that kids get to experience how a concept they learned in science applies to real-world projects including robotics. It's the kind of hands-on experience that will engage more students in science, technology, engineering and math - fields that they might otherwise never have considered."

The community gathers each spring to cheer for Mead Olympians.

Excitement, energy and enthusiasm filled the air as 95 developmentally disabled students took part in the 10th annual Mead Developmental Olympics at Mead High School on May 25.

According to DLC committee member Lindy Terry, this event is "a high point of the year for students, parents, grandparents and staff. Most children, as they grow up, have many opportunities to participate in team sports. For these kids the Mead Developmental Olympics may be the only opportunity they have to be part of a team where their parents and grandparents sit in the stands and cheer them on." Teams have jerseys, and thanks to the fund raising efforts of the Mead High School Breakthrough class and private donations, all teams received and wore a jersey color specific to their school. A badge with the letter "L" was visible on jersey sleeves in remembrance of Mead High classmate Lizzie Jensen, who passed away unexpectedly earlier this spring. (Breakthrough is an elective class addressing personal barriers to learning and success.)

The event included an Opening Ceremony with music courtesy of the Mead High School band and, at the conclusion of the morning's competition, participation ribbons were presented to each child. It was a very special day. We can only imagine the fond memories each student athlete will enjoy when they pull on the team jersey and relive a special moment of inclusion and participation.

Good News for Mead Taxpayers!

- Levy Equalization
 Funding Continues
- District Refinances
 Construction Bonds

We are pleased to report good financial news on two fronts for property owners of the Mead District.

After debating down to the wire, the State Legislature voted to continue fully funding levy equalization. As you may recall from the February M&O Levy Renewal campaign, that funding was in question. As promised estimated school taxes in 2013 will be \$4.45 - down from the voterapproved \$5.17, resulting in savings of \$0.72 per thousand dollars of assessed value.

An unexpected bonus is the favorable refinancing of \$9,360,000 in district construction bonds. Interest savings from this refinance will be passed through to Mead taxpayers. 
Thanks For Another Great Year! A Message from Superintendent Tom Rockefeller

Langston Ward competed in National Poetry Out Loud held in Washington D.C. in May

Langston Ward is a junior at Mead HS and a man of many talents. One of those talents earned him an all-expense paid trip to Washington D.C. May 13-15 to compete as Washington representative State's in the national Poetry Out Loud contest.

Mead Junior Wins Honors in **National Poetry Competition**

Ward managed to use his skillful recitation of poetry to win regional school, and state competitions and earn his way on the national stage while to managing a heavy load of advanced placement classes, and competing in football, track and debate. Langston also plays the cello and bass.

Langston's recitations of Dover Beach by Matthew Arnold, The Truly Great by Stephen Spender and Chicago by Carl Sandburg brought him top ten honors at the national event. Competitors are judged in the categories of: physical presence, accuracy, articulation, level of difficulty and evidence of understanding.

This is the second year Ward has reached nationals. His interest in the Poetry Out Loud competition began in a freshman humanities class with an assignment to memorize and recite a poem - an assignment that obviously sparked an outstanding talent.

Ward plans to compete again next year and hopes post-high school plans can include both football and an eventual career in political science. Seventeen year old Langston Ward just might qualify as a true Renaissance man.
