New requirements include:

- Reduced sodium
- Establishment of calorie maximums and minimums
- Increased fruit & vegetable offerings
- Minimization of trans fat

2012-13 Budget Adopted M



Budget reflects sound and prudent financial practices.

After five years of reducing programs and services because of state and federal budget reductions, the 2012-13 MSD operating budget reflects stable funding, the state legislature's commitment to protect K-12 education from further budget reductions, and the district's continued careful and prudent spending.

This newly adopted budget projects an enrollment of approximately 9,500 students and totals \$83,232,876, which is nearly identical in size to the 2011-12 operating budget.

"Repurposing" Nets Savings for Mead District

"Repurposing" is a term growing in popularity and refers to reusing materials instead of simply throwing things away and buying new. That's what the district plans to do with the signs at Northwood Middle School and the District Office Administration Building - repurpose them. The estimate for a new building sign is \$12,000. Using the skills of district maintenance personnel each building sign can be refurbished for approximately \$4,000 - a substantial savings over brand new.

Reading Curriculum Expands to 4th Grade

We are pleased to announce the second phase of our *Treasures* reading implementation, which adds all 4th grade classrooms. Kindergarten through 3rd grade students were introduced to the new material last year.

All 4th grade teachers received curriculum training in August and are very excited to implement this comprehensive reading program.

A highlight of *Treasures* is its strong non-fiction focus. All students in the class might be learning about a topic like sharks or cloud formation, but each student is reading in a book

appropriate to his or her own reading and skill level.

The curriculum is uniquely designed with built-in assessments that help teachers monitor individual student progress.

According to Learning Services Executive Director Dorcas Wylder, "The district relied on a lengthy study before choosing *Treasures*. Thirty-two teachers helped analyze highly recommended reading curricula and selected two that would meet state and district standards." Those two programs were then featured at a parent night that provided opportunity for community input.

Our goal is to implement 5th grade next year, followed by 6th grade in 2014-15. A comprehensive K-6 reading program will provide a strong learning experience for all students.
