## Farwell Elementary Community Garden

*School Gardens provide a dynamic setting to Observe, Discover, Experiment & Learn*

A love of gardening began to bloom for Farwell 6<sup>th</sup> grade teacher Mary Himley when she was a 5<sup>th</sup> grader. For the past several years she has become intrigued – actually fascinated – with the idea of an all school community garden. Mary's passion for the project is contagious. "We, as a society, have become detached from where our food comes from," says Mary. "It is important for kids to grow their understanding and interest in this area."

This past school year Farwell 6<sup>th</sup> graders began researching school gardens. They examined the pros and cons, wrote research papers, held a debate and presented their findings to

the Farwell PTO and principal Barb Pybus. The PTO was convinced of the many ways school gardening can meaningfully engage students and authorized \$3,000 in seed money.

With seed money in hand and a "thumbs up" vote of support from the Farwell staff, Mary Himley, in collaboration with fellow 6<sup>th</sup> grade teacher Marcy Gallinger, set about to make the garden a reality. Gerahd Pawluk (Mead HS Class of 2014), as part of his Eagle Scout project, built the garden boxes and, at a "Donuts with Dad" event, the boxes were filled with dirt donated by Wittkopf Landscape Supplies. Other businesses who generously contributed to the project are: Wandermere Hardware, River Ridge Hardware, Diamond Lake Lumber, Home Depot, Garden Springs Garden Center, Lowe's and Fred Meyer.

The Farwell Community Garden has one garden box for each grade level plus a box that is wheel chair accessible. Items planted are tied to the science curriculum for that grade. For instance, 3<sup>rd</sup> graders learn about the anatomy of a seed. The garden will provide a living laboratory where students become active participants in the learning process.

What's next? With a sparkle in their eyes, Mary and Marcy talk about school-wide composting, worm bins and a green house or two.

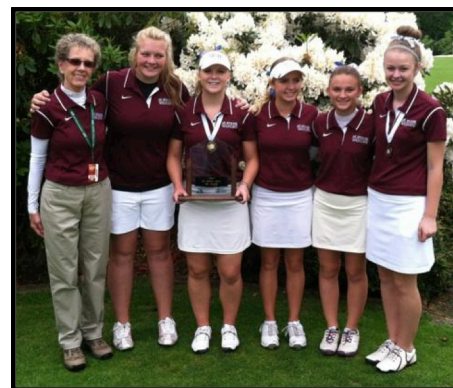

## Highlighting Middle School Science

### Hands-On Learning a Top Priority

Seventh and eighth grade science in the Mead School District has been transformed over the past few years. A textbook teaching focus has been replaced with hands-on learning in cooperative groups where exploration and design thinking are the norm. Students no longer simply memorize facts but are taught and encouraged to find solutions to real world problems.

According to Mountainside Middle School science teachers David Neale and Darrin McComas, "It is important for kids to explore. An integral part of any design process is to design and then redesign again and again. We talk about failing often to succeed sooner."

Subjects covered in middle school science include hunger, cancer, genetic anomalies, disease, environmental concerns, energy, and the physical dynamics of the earth.

"An idea for next year's 8<sup>th</sup> graders," says Mr. McComas, "is to plan a mission to Mars and design a sustainable habitat there." Students, building on their knowledge from 7<sup>th</sup> grade, will need to design and build rockets to get there. Once on Mars they will need to get around . . . rovers or racers or some mode of transportation, with the ability to be powered by an alternative power source (solar or fuel cells), must be investigated and designed. The study of weather patterns and growing conditions on Mars will help guide student development of sustainable food sources.

Northwood and Mountainside science teachers have spent hours developing, refining and fine tuning an exciting hands-on science curriculum for 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders. Thanks to their efforts our middle school students are well prepared for high school science, which includes *Project Lead the Way* biomedical and engineering classes.

## Northwood STEM Club's School of the Future Windmill Design Takes Second at State Competition

STEM Club at Northwood is a fun after-school program all about science, technology, engineering and math. Advisors are science teachers April Beck-Friends and Dave Gamon. In addition to listening to guest speakers (engineers, professors and principals) the STEM Club has, for the past two years, taken part in the *School of the Future Project* sponsored by the Council of Educational Facility Planners International.

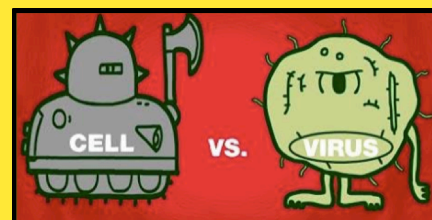
Club members were divided into six design teams - Architecture, Athletics, Information/Technology, Energy, Academics and Community. Their finished product, aptly named *Northwind Middle School* because of the windmill design, placed second overall and featured artificial turf on an accessible roof. Components of the final competition presentation included the use of Prezi software tools, a physical model of the school, architectural floor plans and a written report.
